## DIRECTOR'S NOTE

We reflect on continuity and change at NCYSUR in its 17th year, as we renew our commitment to the health and wellbeing of young people by increasing Australia's capacity to respond effectively to harms from alcohol and other drug use. It is heartening that the Centre is continuing to attract and retain bright young researchers passionate about tackling the challenges of the future. NCYSUR continues to benefit from the experience of highly influential figures appointed to the Centre since its inception, including internationally recognised leaders in substance use policy (Emeritus Professor Wayne Hall), measurement and diagnosis (Honorary Professor John Saunders), and prevention and novel clinical approaches (Honorary Professor Gerald Feeney). Both junior and senior NCYSUR researchers are keen recipients of their ongoing mentorship.

Looking back over the Centre's history, we are proud that Gary Chung Kai Chan, from NCYSUR's first cohort of PhD student graduates, turned postdoctoral fellow, now Associate Professor, has been awarded his second consecutive National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) Investigator Fellowship which shall provide Australia with much needed vaping prevention programs. In 2024, Associate Professor Chan was further recognised by The University of Queensland as an outstanding graduate research supervisor whose own students have won prestigious fellowships, grants, and prizes.

We were delighted that the 2024 Parliamentary Inquiry into the Health Impacts of Alcohol and other Drugs in Australia made extensive use of NCYSUR's invited expert feedback and published research data to inform their deliberations.

The Inquiry for example made particular mention of Deputy Director Professor Leanne Hides' QuikFix intervention, that provides practical, scalable interventions focusing on outcomes that matter to young people exposed to harm from alcohol and other drugs.

Today, NCYSUR is one of the five major research centres that receives critical funding from the Commonwealth Department of Health and Aged Care to support this high impact research. This core funding is enhanced by additional competitive funding. For example, in 2024 approximately one-third of NCYSUR academic staff held highly competitive, Category 1, Australian Research Fellowships supporting their work. NCYSUR also currently leads an NHMRC Centre of Research Excellence, two Medical Research Future Fund grants, an NHMRC Partnership project, and an NHMRC Ideas Grant. This is an extraordinary achievement for a Centre of relatively modest size.

Australian youth continue to be impacted by positive portrayals of alcohol and other drug use on social media, including vaping, dangerous new psychoactive substances detectable via wastewater monitoring, changes in the legal status of cannabis, and much more. On a global scale, there is increasing political and governance unpredictability which amplifies these challenges. At NCYSUR, we are more determined than ever to make the world a better place for our youth, led by our researchers, who inspire with their work ethic, mutual support, high ideals, and passion for excellence.

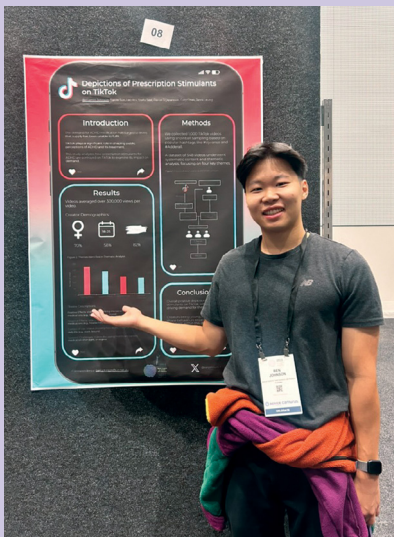

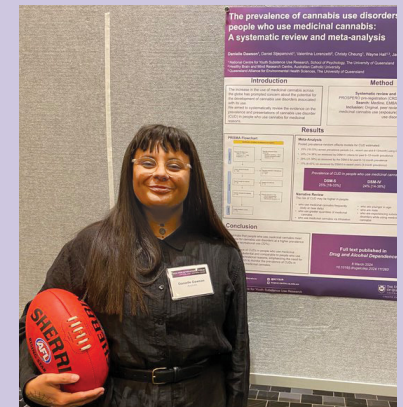

## ABOUT US

NCYSUR is one of the five Commonwealth-funded alcohol and other drug research centres in Australia and the only one of these centres dedicated to youth.

We seek to reduce the prevalence and severity of problem alcohol and drug use in Australian communities; enhance research capacity informing national efforts to address youth substance use; and increase our knowledge on treatment approaches for emerging drugs of concern and innovative treatment models.

- Be at the cutting edge of research into new and innovative ways of preventing and treating problem substance use among young people
- Make significant and tangible improvements to youth service provision
- Positively influence state and national approaches to youth problem substance use prevention and treatment through information dissemination, policy refinement and public advocacy

## AWARDS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

- **PhD student Ms Giang Vu** received funding support from the US National Institute on Drug Abuse 2024 NIDA International Forum, US College on Problems of Drug Dependence, Montréal.
- **PhD graduate Dr Brienna Rutherford’s** doctoral thesis was selected for a 2024 Dean’s Award, UQ Graduate School, for Outstanding Higher Degree by Research Thesis, nominated by her examiners.
- **Postdoctoral Fellow Dr Tesfa Yimer** and **PhD student Ms Giang Vu** were each awarded the Society for the Study of Addiction travel scholarship to attend the Annual Conference in Newcastle, UK and visit research groups at the University of Bath and King’s College London.
- **Honorary Professor John Saunders** was President of the 2024 World Congress on Alcohol and Addictions co-sponsored by the World Health Organization, welcoming world leaders including the Director of the US National Institutes of Health to Melbourne.
- **Deputy Director Professor Leanne Hides** won the best late breaker abstract presentation award at the Australasian Professional Society on Alcohol and other Drugs (APSAD) annual conference in Canberra (mental health, substance use and internet gaming disorder in 3000 young gamers).
- **Emeritus Professor Wayne Hall** was recognised as a Clarivate Highly Cited Award Recipient for the fifth year in a row, recognising his continuing global impact and influence in debates on the best policy options for responding to potential harms from cannabis, alcohol, tobacco, opioids, and stimulants. Highly Cited Authors are ranked in the top 1% of researchers globally, as measured by citations in the world’s leading journals over the past decade.

## KEY CENTRE FUNDING AND RESEARCH OUTCOMES

Australia's National Drug Strategy identifies young people as a priority population. NCYSUR's research and engagement activities are guided by the three pillars of the NDS, demand reduction, supply reduction, and harm reduction. These core research foundations are translated into youth impactful public messages, contributions to policy, prevention and clinical practice.

NCYSUR's core research funding is provided from the Commonwealth Department of Health Drug and Alcohol Program grant for research programs in youth epidemiology and policy, harm reduction, and demand and supply reduction. In 2024 NCYSUR's research program continued to deliver high quality research, translation and support across these domains.


The Centre is fully funded by external grants. Competitive fellowships have facilitated growth via new appointments. Project grants (NHMRC, ARC, Industry-based, Hospital-based) have provided additional research funding support to enhance NCYSUR's core Commonwealth funding.

NCYSUR has also been the recipient of tenders for projects consistent with core research objectives. Institutional start-up funding and philanthropic support were critical in establishing the Centre and leveraging additional research funding.

NCYSUR's high-achieving students are supported by a range of scholarships and conduct research on key topics of public interest. During their PhD studies, our students demonstrate their research achievements by publishing their work in high impact research journals and receiving invitations to present their research at national and international scientific conferences. They attract worldwide attention to the Centre's research program and associated activities, highlighting the relevance of NCYSUR's work while providing opportunities to engage with communities and the policy process.

#### **National Health and Medical Research Council Research Funding**

Several NCYSUR staff and students were recipients of NHMRC fellowships, scholarships, and grants awarded or commencing in 2024. NHMRC is the Australian Government's primary health and medical research funding agency and success in their highly competitive research grants rounds is a strong reflection of the academic and intellectual depth of NCYSUR.



# AWARDED BY NHMRC IN 2024

## Associate Professor Gary Chan

Associate Professor Gary Chung Kai Chan was awarded a second consecutive NHMRC Investigator Fellowship for “Unleashing the power of AI: supercharging social media campaigns against youth vaping”. This study will harness generative artificial intelligence for vaping prevention, revolutionising the development and implementation of large-scale tailored public health campaigns effectively aimed at the multicultural Australian youth population.

Associate Professor Chan was one of only two recipients of this highly competitive award to be mentioned by name in the NHMRC press release. Associate Professor Chan invites all young people in Australia between 6-25 years of age to contribute to this ongoing research.

This project will determine whether implementing a brief intervention model of care at the front end of alcohol and other drug treatment improves client, staff and service outcomes. It is being conducted in partnership with Lived Lives Well, the NSW Network of Alcohol and other Drugs Agencies, and the Queensland Network of Alcohol and Other Drugs Agencies.

# FUNDED BY NHMRC AND COMMENCING IN 2024

## Dr Carmen Lim

Before the award of her PhD, NCYSUR graduate and postdoctoral fellow Dr Carmen Lim was awarded a NHMRC Investigator Fellowship for “Breaking the cycle: leveraging social media to address the public health threat of youth vaping”. Dr Lim was one of the two researchers mentioned by name in the announcement of NHMRC Investigator awards commencing in January 2024. Dr Lim leads a research program to understand how pro-vaping content influences young people’s attitudes, develop a social media intervention, and propose regulatory solutions to reduce youth vaping.

## PhD student Mr Ben Johnson

First year PhD student Mr Ben Johnson was awarded an NHMRC Postgraduate Scholarship for “Learning from the opioid crisis – preventing the proliferation of prescription stimulants for non-medical use.” His research examines both the medical and non-medical use of prescription stimulants, with a particular focus on age groups and challenges arising from the ongoing stimulant shortage. Additionally, Ben is engaged and interested in interdisciplinary projects exploring the intersections of AI, gaming, and cryptocurrency trading, contributing to a broader understanding of emerging trends affecting young people at the nexus of digital innovation and public health.

## Dr Daniel Stjepanović and Dr Tianze Sun

Senior Research Fellow Dr Daniel Stjepanović, Research Fellow Dr Tianze Sun (PhD awarded July 2024) and colleagues at the Queensland Alliance for Environmental Health Sciences at UQ and the University of Waterloo, Canada were awarded an NHMRC Ideas Grant for “Monitoring nicotine: triangulating social media, global survey and wastewater data to inform future vaping and smoking policies”. The project will establish a surveillance system for smoking and vaping using cutting edge technologies and global partnerships, providing health experts and government with the tools to respond to the rapidly changing vaping and tobacco smoking landscape, disproportionately affecting young people.

# MEDICAL RESEARCH FUTURE FUND

## COMMENCING IN 2024

Deputy Director Professor Leanne Hides, Dr Nina Pocuca, Dr Gabrielle Campbell and colleagues were awarded a Medical Research Future Fund grant under the Maternal Health and Healthy Lifestyle scheme to evaluate the “QuikFix Good Night Out Program: a new social network targeted approach to reducing alcohol and other drug use and related harm in young university students”. Leanne is leading the interdisciplinary team of UQ investigators including UQ Pro-Vice-Chancellor for Teaching and Learning Professor Doune Macdonald and colleagues from the School of Psychology and the Centre for the Business and Economics of Health. This novel program will increase access to evidence based and cost-effective reduction of substance use and related harm for university students nationally.

This research will leverage generative AI to co-design a personalised social media campaign with young people to combat the rise of vaping and test its effectiveness in a randomised controlled trial. *Ongoing grants are listed in the Appendices.*

## NCYSUR ANNUAL RESEARCH SYMPOSIUM

NCYSUR held its annual Research Symposium on 1 March 2024 in Brisbane. More than 650 people registered for this hybrid event; more than 70 attended in person and an early career researcher networking event was held after the symposium.

NCYSUR speakers from PhD students to senior academics showcased and discussed their research in youth alcohol and other drug treatment, harm reduction, policy and prevention funded under the Australian Government's Drug and Alcohol Program, the National Health and Medical Research Council, the Medical Research Future Fund, and other sources.

The program featured international keynotes from NCYSUR's collaborators Professor Keith Humphreys, Chairman of the Stanford University-Lancet Commission on the North American Opioid Crisis (in person) on synthetic opioids, and Professor David Hammond, University of Waterloo, Canada on the International Tobacco Control Policy Evaluation Project on youth smoking, vaping and cannabis use (online). The symposium attracted a wide range of participants including policy makers, health and alcohol and other drug treatment services, and local government representatives. ## THE GOOD NIGHT OUT PROGRAM

NCYSUR is dedicated to improving access to prevention and early intervention programs for young people through evidence-based research. Led by Professor Leanne Hides and coordinated by Research Fellow Dr Lauren Fothergill, the Good Night Out (GNO) Program is designed to reduce the risk of alcohol and other drug (AOD)-related harm in university residential colleges. This research is primarily funded by the Medical Research Future Fund (MRFF).

## HARNESSING STUDENT AND LEADER INSIGHTS: A CO-DESIGN PROCESS

The AOD trivia workshop was co-designed with 77 student leaders in 2020. In 2024 a further seven co-design workshops were conducted with first-year students and student leaders from four UQ colleges to update the program content and ensure its continued relevance for young people.

### Key areas of focus included:

- Understanding AOD Culture in Colleges: Identified emerging trends and student perspectives to improve harm reduction strategies.
- Enhancing Knowledge & Leadership Training: Updated the first-year trivia workshop to enhance AOD knowledge. Provided student leader training with interactive elements and practical applications.
- Optimising Content Delivery: Explored trusted information sources, visual design, and peer-led approaches to improve engagement.
- Inclusivity and Accessibility: Ensured workshops reflect diverse student experiences, making content relevant for all participants.

### From Co-Design to National Implementation

Findings from the co-design process have been used to inform the design of a national Randomised Controlled Trial (RCT), which will evaluate the scalability, efficacy, and cost-effectiveness of the QuikFix GNO program. This RCT will be tested in universities across three Australian states.

### The program includes:

- AOD Trivia Workshop – Delivered by student leaders during orientation week in the form of an engaging trivia-style gameshow to improve harm reduction knowledge.
- Student Leader Training – Trained student leaders in the delivery of the AOD trivia workshop to increase their AOD knowledge and skills in supporting harm reduction efforts among their peers.
- QuikFix Brief Telehealth Intervention – Engaging key social influencers in a single session harm reduction intervention to promote positive behaviour change within peer networks.
- Pilot trials have demonstrated the program's feasibility in reducing AOD use.

### Enhancing Access to Early Intervention

NCYSUR remains committed to developing and evaluating effective, research-driven AOD harm reduction programs for young people. The upcoming national RCT will provide valuable insights into whether the Good Night Out Program can be implemented at scale across other universities, as well as its cost-effectiveness, and long-term impact on student AOD use, mental health and wellbeing.



# ENGAGEMENT WITH THE POLICY PROCESS

NCYSUR embraces opportunities to participate in the policy process, a key part of its mission. This includes preparing submissions and providing expert testimony to Parliamentary Inquiries. Supervisors encourage PhD students to promote their research findings to decision makers and the general public.

In late March, the Australian Senate referred its Vaping Reforms Bill 2024 (Therapeutic Goods and Other Legislation Amendment) to the Community Affairs Legislation Committee for inquiry and report by 8 May. PhD student Ms Giang Vu led an invited submission on the need for reforms to regulation of online markets on social media platforms, a key focus of NCYSUR. The submission cited new research led by NCYSUR early career researchers and PhD students published in leading national and international scientific journals including Addictive Behaviors and Tobacco Control. NCYSUR gave invited expert testimony to the Committee on May 1. Public proceedings of the Parliament are broadcast live, recorded in Hansard and can be found via the Inquiry website.

In May, the Australian Senate and House of Representatives appointed a Joint Select Committee to conduct an Inquiry on the influence and impacts of social media on Australian society and report to the Parliament by November. NCYSUR PhD graduate and Research Fellow Dr Tesfa Yimer led NCYSUR's submission which showcased findings from peer reviewed papers led by NCYSUR PhD students published in leading international scientific journals including Addiction.

This submission led to NCYSUR's young researchers being interviewed for a feature story in the October 14 edition of the Courier Mail, "Concerns social media leading more youth to use drugs, alcohol".

In August, following a referral from the Minister for Health and Aged Care, the Hon Mark Butler MP, the House Standing Committee on Health, Aged Care and Sport commenced an Inquiry into the health impacts of alcohol and other drugs in Australia.

**The ongoing Inquiry includes four terms of reference:**

1. Whether current services deliver equity for all Australians, value for money, and best outcomes for all concerned;
2. Whether current programs are effective across all jurisdictions for prevention, reduction of harms, priority populations, equity in treatment and prevention;
3. How other sectors beyond health could contribute; and
4. What is the policy experience and best practice in Australia and overseas.

195 submissions from individuals and organisations including NCYSUR have been published on the Committee website and six public hearings have been held. NCYSUR Deputy Director Leanne Hides and Senior Research Fellow Dr Daniel Stjepanovic were invited as expert witness to the Inquiry. Their testimony highlighted NCYSUR's work and how this research can inform evidence-based policy. NCYSUR Honorary Professor Paul Clark, Director of the Alcohol and Drug Assessment Unit, Princess Alexandra Hospital, a frontline alcohol and drug services and support organisation, was also called as an expert witness and facilitated a clinic site visit for Committee members. The Inquiry will resume in 2025.

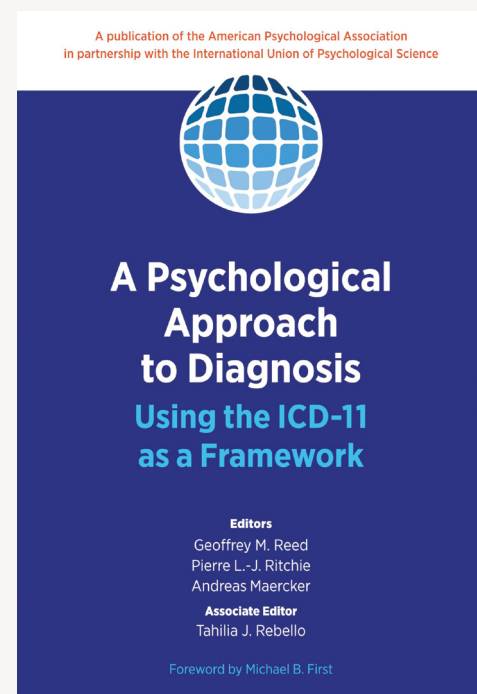
# CONTRIBUTIONS TO POLICY AND PRACTICE

Research Fellows Ms Tianze Sun, Dr Carmen Lim and Dr Daniel Stjepanović conducted a workshop with the Logan Youth Action Group to co-design AI-generated materials for vaping prevention. NCYSUR PhD students Ms Giang Vu and Ms Caitlin McClure-Thomas assisted in moderating the sessions. Facilitated by Associate Professor Gary Chan, NCYSUR is building a collaborative relationship with this group of around 30 young people from a wide range of cultural backgrounds that will inform grant funded projects in future.

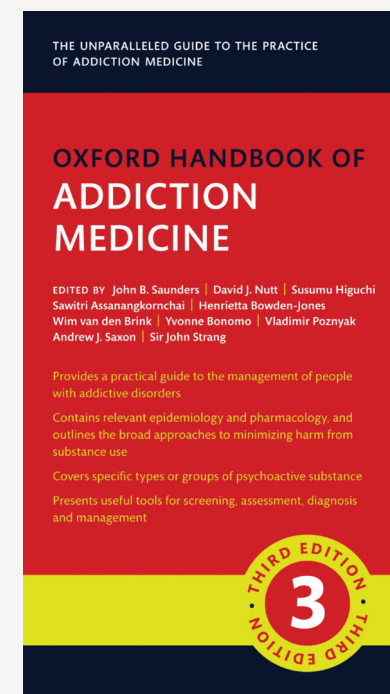
Oxford University Press published the third edition of the *Oxford Handbook of Addiction Medicine*. The Handbook offers guidance to clinicians incorporating pharmacology, neurobiology, psychology, epidemiology and public health. Honorary Professor John Saunders led the editorial team and contributed as an author to 19 chapters, including 4 out of 5 NCYSUR authored chapters on epidemiology, screening and brief interventions, opioids and psychostimulants. NCYSUR Director Jason Connor and Honorary Professor Gerald Feeney led a chapter on polysubstance use.

The American Psychological Association published *A Psychological Approach to Diagnosis Using the ICD-11 as a Framework*. This volume provides clinicians around the world with the basis for delivering high quality, evidence-informed care based on the World Health Organization's International Classification of Diseases. Honorary Professor John Saunders and Director Professor Jason Connor contributed the chapter on substance use disorders.

Emeritus Professor Wayne Hall was invited to be an expert peer reviewer on a draft report on the public health implications of legalising cannabis by the US National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, established by the US Congress to provide expert advice to the nation on complex problems and inform public policy decisions. The report was released in September 2024.

Contributions to Policy and Practice – Oxford Handbook 3rd edition



Emeritus Professor Wayne Hall was invited to advise RAND corporation in California, USA and the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention on developing ethical principles to govern the introduction of wastewater-based epidemiology into the USA to monitor the illicit opioid and methamphetamine use that has produced an unprecedented epidemic of drug overdose deaths in the USA over the past two decades. Director Jason Connor and Emeritus Professor are supported in an ARC Linkage funded collaboration with the Queensland Alliance for Environmental Health Sciences on *Using multiple data sources to understand the opioid crisis in Australia*.

In 2024, the World Health Organization released their clinical treatment guideline for tobacco cessation in adults (18 and over). The “first of its kind” resource recommends interventions and treatments for all tobacco-related products, utilising interventions with varied delivery, including digital and in-person interventions, with treatment options expanding focus from behavioural to pharmacological options in order to remove barriers and limitations from impeding the cessation journey. The document acknowledges the contributions made by members of NCYSUR, using reviews of evidence conducted by NCYSUR NHMRC Emerging Leadership Fellows Associate Professor Gary Chan and Associate Professor Janni Leung, Senior Research Fellow Dr Daniel Stjepanović, Postdoctoral Fellow Dr Tesfa Yimer, and PhD student Ms Caitlin McLure-Thomas. This global resource could benefit more than 750 million people in ceasing tobacco-use and reducing health and economic burdens from tobacco-use-related diseases. Colleagues at the NHMRC Centre of Research Excellence on Achieving the Tobacco Endgame, led by Director and Chief Investigator Professor Coral Gartner, facilitated this contribution.

Emeritus Professor Wayne Hall was invited by Health Canada to advise on suitable Health Warning Messages on cannabis product packaging, to sustain effectiveness on message credibility and acceptance among other issues. Canada legalised cannabis in 2018.

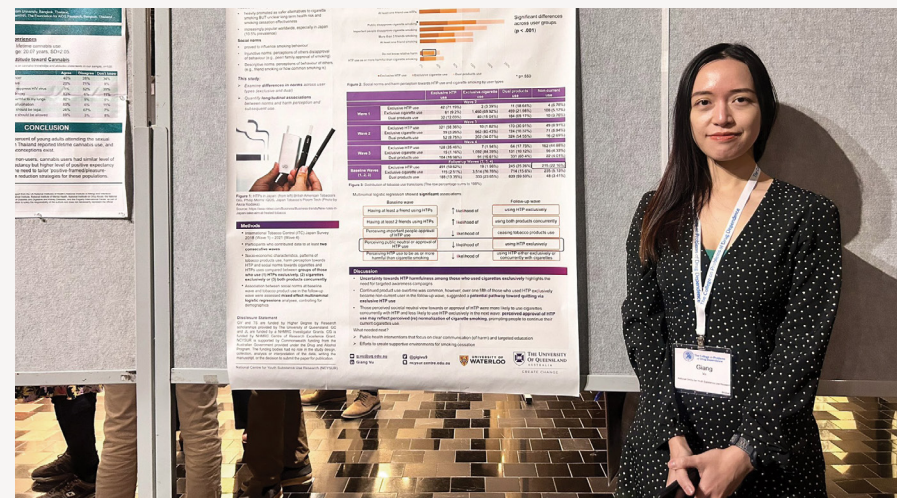


# INTERNATIONAL MEETINGS

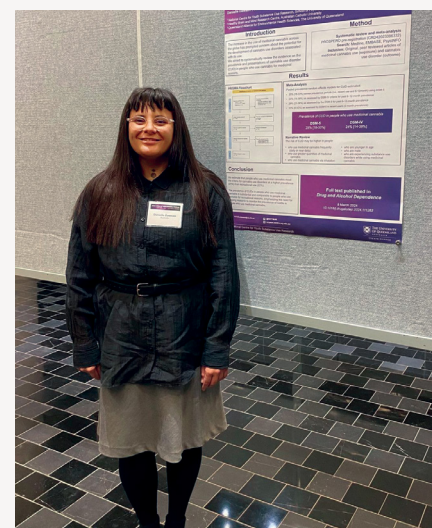
PhD students Ms Giang Vu and Ms Danielle Dawson presented at the 2024 NIDA International Forum, US National Institute on Drug Abuse, June 14-15, held in conjunction with CPDD 2024, the 86th Annual Scientific Meeting of the College on Problems of Drug Dependence, June 15-19 in Montréal. The CPDD is one of the most significant conferences in substance abuse research, attended by leading researchers and policy makers from around the world. Ms Vu received NIDA support for CPDD registration; Ms Dawson's poster was published in Drug and Alcohol Dependence.

Ms Vu, Ms Dawson and Dr Sun gave an oral presentation and two posters at the 17th annual conference of the International Society for the Study of Drug Policy hosted by the Centre de recherche du CHUM (CRCHUM), affiliated with the University of Montréal. On 19 June, Ms Vu gave an oral presentation on social norms towards tobacco use in Japan and Ms Dawson presented her poster on the prevalence and self-reported reasons of cannabis use for medical purposes in Australia. On June 21, Dr Sun presented her poster on exposure to e-cigarette marketing and youth e-cigarette use in the United States. Dr Sun and Ms Vu presented to the research team at CRCHUM at the University of Montréal on NCYSUR's methodologically intensive work related to youth vaping.

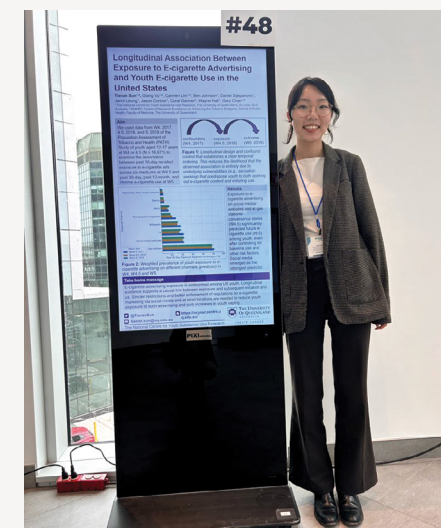
On June 25, Dr Sun and Ms Vu presented to the International Tobacco Control Policy Evaluation Project team at the Department of Psychology, University of Waterloo, Ontario on "Vaping in the Australian and global setting" and held discussions about further publications on Japan, Republic of Korea, and other countries who have joined the ITC Project. As a result of networking at the University of Montreal, Dr Sun gave an invited NDARC webinar in October which received high engagement on social media and over 200 individuals registered.

## WORLD CONGRESS ON ALCOHOL AND ADDICTIONS

In September, NCYSUR led several symposia at the Third World Congress on Alcohol and Addictions in Melbourne, a joint congress of the International Society for Biomedical Research on Alcoholism and the Asia-Pacific Society for Alcohol and Addiction Research.

Congress President John Saunders represented the World Health Organization and gave the introductory presentation on WHO policy and guidelines for disorders due to substance use and addictive behaviours. He has been Honorary Professor in NCYSUR since its establishment in 2008, has advised WHO since 1981 and is a member of the Expert Advisory Panel on Mental Health and Substance Abuse and the ICD-11 Working Group on the Classification of Substance-Related and Addictive Disorders. Professor George Koob, Director of the US National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism was the opening keynote speaker.

In the opening speech, Professor Saunders highlighted the changing nature of the field, stating “Historically these congresses, which originally date from 1982, have had a strong biomedical and pharmacological treatment focus.

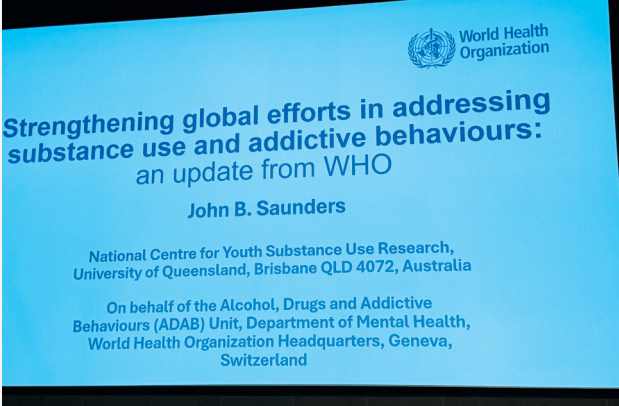
However, periodically their scope is expanded to include the broad spectrum of alcohol and addictions research and practise, and this is the case with the 2024 Congress (hence its name, World Congress on Alcohol) one of the six streams encompasses the range of psychoactive substances including relevant prescription medications in addition to alcohol, and importantly it also embraces gambling and videogaming, and other problems related to addictive behaviours, and their prevention and treatment.”

Deputy Director Professor Leanne Hides led the Symposium on innovative treatments targeting biopsychosocial risk and protective factors for substance use. She presented on The QuikFix Good Night (GNO) social network targeted digital health program for reducing alcohol and other drug use in first year university college students in the Symposium on digital innovation in alcohol and other drug use research and practice. Professor Hides and Dr Gabrielle Campbell led the Symposium on Meaningful Outcomes in Substance Use Research, Centre of Research Excellence (MO CRE) - Routine outcome monitoring and feedback in alcohol and other drug treatment: what is currently known? Associate Professor Gary Chan chaired the Symposium on The International Gaming Study – a 4-country study to understanding gaming disorder and unhealthy gaming.

## LISBON ADDICTIONS

NCYSUR travelled overseas for several meetings including Lisbon Addictions, the fifth European Conference on Addictive Behaviours and Dependencies held in Lisbon from 23-25 October, organised by the Portuguese Institute on Addictive Behaviors and Dependencies, the European Union Drugs Agency, the International Society of Addiction Journal Editors and the Society for the Study of Addiction.

Lisbon Addictions is the biggest drug and alcohol conference in Europe and takes place every two years, hosting 2000 participants from over 100 countries worldwide in 2024. This multidisciplinary conference fosters large scale networking and showcases leading international research aimed at informing policy development and practice through a better understanding of contemporary issues in addiction science and addictive behaviours. An array of side events offers abundant opportunities especially to research higher degree students and early career researchers.

Associate Professors Janni Leung and Gary Chan, Research Fellows Dr Daniel Stjepanović, Dr Carmen Lim, Dr Tesfa Mekonen, PhD students Mr Habte Gobie, Ms Danielle Dawson, Mr Ben Johnson, Ms Giang Vu, and Ms Caitlin McClure Thomas presented on gaming disorder and physical harm from excessive gaming, second hand smoking mass media campaigns, the relationship between cannabis and tobacco use, cannabis use disorders among medicinal cannabis users, the portrayal of ADHD medications on TikTok, social norms on tobacco use, and internet gaming disorder.



## APSAD

The Australasian Professional Society on Alcohol and other Drugs (APSAD) held its annual conference in Canberra (Ngunnawal country), from 30 October to 1 November 2024. The event featured Australian and international researchers, health professionals, and people with lived and living experience in the alcohol and other drugs (AOD) sector.

NCYSUR Deputy Director Professor Leanne Hides chaired the symposium on Bringing Value Based Healthcare in AOD Services to Life. She also presented a late breaking abstract on mental health, substance use and internet gaming disorder in 3000 young gamers, which won the best late breaker abstract presentation award.

Dr Zoe Walter presented results from an implementation trial of trauma-informed residential treatment, reporting moderators of treatment completion, substance use and mental health outcomes. The trial was funded by NCYSUR's Australian Government Drug and Alcohol Program grant awarded to Professor Hides and NCYSUR Director Professor Jason Connor.

NCYSUR PhD candidate Gigi Vu presented her poster at the Opening Plenary on why young people are using disposable vapes, as well as results from her study on trends in social norms towards cigarette smoking and e-cigarette use in US youth between 2015 - 2021, using data from the Population Assessment of Tobacco and Health (PATH) Study, a national longitudinal study of tobacco use and health impacts. NHMRC Emerging Leadership Fellow Dr Carmen Lim presented on changes in route of cannabis administration over time in the USA and Canada, finding a shift from smoking to vaping and edibles.

NCYSUR Postdoctoral Fellow Dr Tianze Sun presented work led by Dr Carmen Lim on the influence of celebrities and influencers on youth susceptibility to tobacco and vaping. Master of Public Health Student Yin Mun Teo presented "From content to clouds", a study led by Dr Lim on the bidirectional relationship between exposure to tobacco related content and youth smoking.

PhD candidate Ms Danielle Dawson presented her work on the motives behind medical, recreational, and dual cannabis use in Australia. PhD candidate and medical student Mr Brandon Cheng presented his findings highlighting how exposure to alcohol-related content on social media can influence young people's drinking behaviours. PhD candidate Mr Jack Chung presented results from a study he led on the sociodemographic and mental health profile of persons who vape cannabis in the USA.

## CANNABIS LEGALISATION IN GERMANY

### Abstract

In the past decade, some jurisdictions have reformed their cannabis control policies (e.g., Uruguay, US states, Canada). On April 1st 2024, Germany adopted a cannabis legalization policy. Improving public health, public safety and youth protection were aims of the new cannabis policy with "two pillars". A first pillar relies on not-for-profit self- and/or community-based cannabis supply (cannabis clubs). It came into force on July 1st. A second pillar foresees a commercial cannabis production and distribution including higher-risk cannabis products (e.g., edibles, oils/extracts) with a scientific framework. The presentation will reflect on the current opportunities and risks of the new cannabis law in Germany. First-hand experiences will be described. The immediate anecdotal consequences of legalisation in Germany will also be discussed. Unfortunately, scientific data on the evaluation is not yet available.

**About the speaker:**  
Professor Hoch is a clinical psychologist, licensed psychotherapist, and working as a researcher in the field of substance use disorders for 25 years. She is scientific and administrative director of the IFT Institute for Therapy Research, Centre for Mental Health and Addiction Research. She teaches as a professor at Charlotte Freising University, Munich, Germany. She is interested in the effects of cannabinoids on the human body, especially on mental health. Professor Hoch is involved in a large international research network and advises the World Health Organization, the European Agency on Drugs (EUADA), the German Federal Government and other authorities. She received several research awards for her work.

# DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY STUDENTS

NCYSUR's research program and opportunities attract high-achieving PhD students. Centre students are supported by the following scholarships: NHMRC; Australian Postgraduate Award; Australian Research Training Program; UQ International PhD; UQ Earmarked; UQ Graduate School.

In 2024, 18 student led papers were published in leading journals in the field, including *Addiction*, *Addictive Behaviors*, *Drug and Alcohol Dependence*, *Drug and Alcohol Review*, the *International Journal of Alcohol and Drug Research*, *The Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs*, and *Tobacco Control*.

NCYSUR students collectively were awarded grants as chief investigators including NHMRC grants, gave in person and virtual oral and poster presentations at national and international conferences, conducted workshops with youth groups, were subjects of live media interviews, led invited submissions to Parliament, provided invited expert witness testimony to Parliament, and participated in evidence reviews for the World Health Organization.

Four PhD degrees were awarded to NCYSUR students in 2024. Dr Brienna Rutherford's doctoral thesis was selected for a 2024 Dean's Award by the Dean of the UQ Graduate School for Outstanding Higher Degree by Research Thesis, nominated by her examiners as an outstanding contribution to the field of research. Dr Tianze Sun was appointed to a research fellow position at NCYSUR after success as Chief Investigator B on an NHMRC Ideas grant before the award of her PhD. Dr Calvert Tisdale has taken up a postdoctoral research fellowship at NDARC.

Dr Lily Davidson has been a postdoctoral research associate at the University of Cincinnati, USA on a NIH funded project in collaboration with Brown University and Latrobe, followed by a postdoctoral research fellowship at the University of Sydney, strengthening NCYSUR's research links with these leading institutes.

## INDUSTRY AND CLINICAL

Representatives of many of these services are represented on the NCYSUR Advisory Board and have formal UQ affiliate joint appointments with the Centre. These include:

### **Alcohol and Drug Assessment Unit, Princess Alexandra Hospital**

The Alcohol and Drug Assessment Unit is a multidisciplinary outpatient Liaison Clinical Service at a large Australian metropolitan university teaching hospital. The team of doctors, nurses, social workers and psychologists offers assessment and management of substance misuse and problems related to addiction treatment programs for alcohol, tobacco, cannabis, and stimulants. They follow best practice in alcohol and drug treatment, education, research and addictions medicine. This program accepts self-referrals and no formal referrals are required to access the service.

### **Brisbane Catholic Education**

NCYSUR partners with Brisbane Catholic Education to deliver innovative social marketing programs in schools to combat alcohol-related problems. Key components of Australian Research Council Linkage Grant funded programs are now embedded in the curriculum of 183 schools in Queensland.

### **Logan Youth Action Group**

The Logan Youth Action Group is an initiative of the Logan City Council and comprises a diverse group of over 30 members, aged 14 to 25 years old from more than 10 cultural backgrounds. The group members live, work or study in the City of Logan and are passionate about making a positive difference in the local community. The group plays an active role in ensuring the needs of young people are heard, while also turning ideas into exciting community projects.



### **ChaplainWatch Inc**

ChaplainWatch is an independent Brisbane-based charity, focused on public safety in public spaces. It provides a unique, non-authoritarian service, which encompasses crisis intervention, conflict resolution, front-line first aid, counselling and guidance, secondary victim support, and welfare assistance. This rapid response service works in partnership with other official services. ChaplainWatch is a key partner in the QuikFix early intervention project.

### **Children's Health Queensland Children & Youth Mental Health Services**

Children & Youth Mental Health Services at Children's Health Queensland specialises in helping infants, children and young people up to the age of 18 years who have complex mental health and drug and alcohol needs. CYMHS is a key partner on the QuikFix early intervention research program.

### **Dovetail/Insight**

Dovetail is the auspicing body that provides clinical advice and professional support to workers, services and communities across Queensland who engage with young people affected by alcohol and other drug use. Insight is the leading provider of alcohol and other drug training, education, clinical advice and practice support for workers and services in Queensland.

### **Drug & Alcohol Brief Intervention Team (DABIT; Queensland Health)**

Based at key Queensland hospitals, the DABIT service model is based on successful services overseas, and targets people with alcohol and drug problems not currently in treatment. Young people attending emergency departments often have substance use problems. For example, road trauma, assaults and injuries are often associated with high risk drinking and other drug usage. By providing targeted brief interventions, DABIT can reduce the likelihood of patients progressing from substance use to substance dependence. Professor Hides will implement and evaluate the evidence-based QuikFix early intervention model in these services.

### **Lives Lived Well**

Lives Lived Well is the body that auspices the non-government drug and alcohol treatment sector in Queensland. It has a strong focus on young people, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, and families.

### **Mater Health Adolescent Drug & Alcohol Withdrawal Service (ADAWS)**

ADAWS supports young people through individualised and group support, brief interventions, relapse prevention planning and alternative drug-free activities. The service also aims to reduce drug-related harm by utilising harm reduction strategies that take personal goals and choices into account. ADAWS is a key implementation site of the QuikFix early intervention program and is involved in several other treatment studies.

### **Queensland Alcohol & Drug Information Service (ADIS; Queensland Health)**

ADIS provides people with a range of interventions that influence and support the decision to reduce or cease harmful substance use. Referrals to alcohol and other drugs services can come from the individual experiencing the problem, family and friends, community services, Hospital and Health Services, GPs, Police, Courts and Corrective Services.

### **Queensland Injury Surveillance Unit (QISU; Queensland Health/Mater Health)**

Since 1988, Queensland Injury Surveillance Unit (QISU) continuously collects urban injury data from Brisbane's major hospitals, as well as periodically collecting rural data. It has strong collaborations with NCYSUR and Professor Hides in her work on preventable youth alcohol and drug injuries.
